History

- The State Road Department (SRD), the precursor to FDOT, was formed by the Florida Legislature in June 2, 1915 and it officially began operating in October 8, 1915.
- SRD was originally tasked with the construction, maintenance and mapping of Florida's state roads.
- In 1916, the Bankhead Act passed by Congress further expanded these responsibilities and in 1969, FDOT was formed.

Today

- Transportation in Florida now includes 15 seaports and 2,365 miles of waterways; 2,753 miles of rail line; 122,088 centerline miles of public roadways with 12,164 bridges; 780 airports; two spaceports with 10 launch facilities; and 30 urban transit systems.
- Florida has set the pace for transportation innovation and it now accommodates the third largest state in the nation and the 20th largest economy in the world.
- At its core, transportation is about people. **FDOT employees and contractors are an integral part of this monumental effort**.
- Florida is one of the fastest growing states in the nation. The historic investments in transportation infrastructure support Florida's continued economic success and job growth.
